2023 Mid-Atlantic Network Update

In mid-February, more than 60 Audubon supporters attended the eighth annual I Bird I Vote Maryland Conservation Summit. Maryland's new Secretary of Natural Resources, Josh Kurtz, who is an avid birder, spoke about the new Governor's environmental priorities and took audience questions. The assembled group also heard presentations from leaders at Safe Skies Maryland and the Maryland League of Conservation Voters, as well as Senators Cardin and Van Hollen. National Audubon Society staff offered their expertise on actionable ways to advocate, including how to engage with the Migratory Bird Explorer. Thank you all who attended!

And this month, we are excited to host the first ever I Bird I Vote

Pennsylvania Conservation Summit! This summit, being created in partnership with the Appalachian Audubon Society, will be held in-person on March 25, 2023, at the <u>Olewine Nature Center in Harrisburg, PA</u>. The day will focus on issues facing Pennsylvania's birds and the habitats they need to survive, with sessions exploring Audubon's state, regional, and national conservation and policy priorities. <u>Please join us for this special day (and for the 8:00AM bird walk that morning)</u>.

Another exciting event took place last month with the first of many educational webinars that we hope to offer our network. This one focused on Pennsylvania environmental policy priorities and accessing the incentives included in the Inflation Reduction Act. Our colleagues Ezra Thrush (PennFuture) and Flora Cardoni (PennEnvironment) joined us to examine these pressing topics, and Audubon Mid-Atlantic's Policy Director Jim Brown offered an invaluable Audubon perspective. 2023 Mid-Atlantic Policy Update

In Pennsylvania as the House and Senate begin the session this week following February's special elections, we look forward to advancing a robust statewide policy platform which will advance funding and programming for natural climate solutions, habitat conservation, renewable energy, and equitable access to nature. We know this spring in Harrisburg will have us working to ensure Pennsylvania stays a member of the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI), AND develops strong Alternative Energy Portfolio Standards (AEPS). The two programs are vital to protecting Pennsylvania's varied bird habitats from the threats of climate change.

In Maryland we are working with other environmental organizations to support legislation focused on sustainable building requirements, land conservation and renewable energy. Read more about these priority bills on our website.


Mid-Atlantic Forest Update

This spring, Audubon Mid-Atlantic staff will again take important steps to protect and restore Pennsylvania's forests for migrating and breeding birds.

 We have hired Resilience Planning and Design to craft a plan that creates migratory stopover sites at key places along the Kittatinny Ridge.

- We will expand The Nature Conservancy's Cove Mountain migratory stopover site by an additional 4 acres. Staff will use a lower cost technique to create the new supportive bird habitat with an eye toward deploying the method at additional private lands along the Ridge in the years ahead.
- Forest Program Associate Josh Rittenhouse will host a Healthy Forest training webinar for Pennsylvania land trusts. This webinar is linked to work that Audubon is doing to develop a land trust network across the state that is committed to creating and managing bird habitat within their forests.

Delaware River Watershed

Audubon's Delaware River Watershed program is helping Schuylkill Highlands residents start or enhance riparian buffers on their properties with free native plants. Riparian buffers are vegetated areas along streams that help to stabilize eroding banks and improve water quality in the Delaware River. By using native plants, participants can support local wildlife and migratory birds which utilize the plants for shelter and food.

Eligible properties contain streams and are located within one of the priority sub-watersheds within the Schuylkill Highlands: Beaver Run, Hay Creek, Pine Creek, French Creek, Birch Run, Pigeon Run, Pigeon Creek, Pickering Creek or Rock Run.
